Twelfth Sunday in Ordinary Time Year A, 25th June 2023

'In your great love, answer me'

Because we live in anxious, troubling times, where so many people around the world are suffering intolerably, today's readings can speak especially to us.

Jeremiah, in the **First Reading**, reflects on how his preaching has brought him suffering and isolation. Yet 'the Lord is at my side, a mighty hero.'

The **Psalmist** cries out in anguish, but like Jeremiah, trusts that the Lord will answer with 'help that never fails.'

St Paul considers how sin and death hold sway in the world, but Christ has gained for us the abundant free gift of divine grace. (Second Reading)

In the **Gospel**, Jesus twice tells his disciples, 'Do not be afraid'. Suffering will come their way, but the Father will always care tenderly for them.

Our lives, and those of our loved ones too, can be weighed down by fears, concerns or pain. May we strive this week to place our trust in the Lord, who is the 'strength of his people'.



Opening Prayer Grant, O Lord, that we may always revere and love your holy name, for you never deprive of your guidance those you set firm on the foundation of your love.

Psalm 68 (69)

R./ In your great love, answer me, O God.

It is for you I suffer taunts, that shame covers my face, that I have become a stranger to my brothers, an alien to my own mother's sons. I burn with zeal for your house and taunts against you fall on me.

This is my prayer to you, my prayer for your favour. In your great love, answer me, O God, with your help that never fails: Lord, answer, for your love is kind: in your compassion turn towards me.

The poor when they see it will be glad and God-seeking hearts will revive; for the Lord listens to the needy and does not spurn his servants in their chains. Let the heavens and the earth give him praise, the sea and all its living creatures.

As I prepare to pray, I relax into God's presence by slowing down, breathing deeply, and putting concerns to one side.

When I am ready I read the psalm slowly, a couple of times.

As I pray it, I may wish to recall Jesus's Passion. Or perhaps I choose to make it a prayer for peoples who suffer in our world, for an individual I know, or indeed for myself.

Perhaps the psalm response speaks to me, and I can draw strength from God's great love; his unfailing help and compassion. I ponder this.

With the psalmist, I turn to praise and give thanks to God, joining in with the whole universe.

I end my prayer grateful for this time spent with the Lord.

Gospel Matthew 10: 26–33

Jesus instructed the Twelve as follows: 'Do not be afraid. For everything that is now covered will be uncovered, and everything now hidden will be made clear. What I say to you in the dark, tell in the daylight; what you hear in whispers, proclaim from the rooftops.

'Do not be afraid of those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul; fear those rather who can destroy both body and soul in hell. Can you not buy two sparrows for a penny? And yet not one falls to the ground without your Father knowing. Why, every hair on your head has been counted. So there is no need to be afraid; you are worth more than hundreds of sparrows.

'So if anyone declares themself for me in the presence of others, I will declare myself for them in the presence of my Father in heaven. But the one who disowns me in the presence of others, I will disown in the presence of my Father in heaven.'

I take the time to become aware of God's presence, knowing that he loves me unconditionally.

I ask his Spirit to help me pray.

In time I take up the Gospel text and read it slowly.

These sayings of Jesus are words of encouragement to his disciples after he has warned them that they will be persecuted.

As I ponder the text, where do I find encouragement?

Which words of Jesus empower me and strengthen my resolve to follow him?

Jesus tells me not to be afraid: I have worth in his eyes. In what ways do I show that I truly believe this?

I speak to him from my heart and listen to him.

I think of those who feel that no one cares for them. I ask the Lord to bring them comfort and reassurance.

Maybe God is asking me to respond in some way?

I draw my prayer to a close with a Glory be ...
